- 2. Copyright issues. As a lawabiding not-for-profit organization, it is incumbent upon us to ensure that we do not infringe any copyrights when we publish our bulletin. That means that we do not publish somebody else's photo or article without getting permission. If you saw it on Facebook (or any other social media) it does not imply that it is free to use. It is always important to verify that we have permission to use it. Sometimes, that may require the payment of a license fee. If you submit any pictures taken by others, please check to see that you have permission. We implicitly assume that anything you submit is your work (your words and pictures taken by you) and you are giving us the right to publish it. Also, if the picture contains faces of people. ensure that those who are in the picture do not object to their pictures being published.
- 3. Getting the correct information. During my trip to Europe, I was asked by some of my hosts if Servas is planning to go in a different direction. I was a bit surprised by this question till I realized that there was a concern for some that Servas was looking to become a more "volunteer-oriented" organization. Apparently, this concern arose when some people got to see some web pages (still in construction for Version 2). On behalf of SI Exco, I would like to assure you that we are not planning any such major changes. To find out what SI Exco is thinking or doing, please go through the minutes of the monthly meetings, which should be accessible to all members who log into Servas.Org. This is a better source of information about SI Exco than web pages that are under construction.

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Results of the Extra-Ordinary General Assembly Vote

Servas International conducted a May 15-25 2024 Extraordinary Servas International General Assembly (EO-SIGA 2024) to vote on three motions. 58 SI Member Groups (SI MGs) out of the 63 currently eligible to vote, did vote. This was a substantial increase compared to the November 2023 SI Distant Vote (SI DV) when 47 out of the then 60 eligible SI MGs voted. All motions received at least 50 votes in favour of each proposal.





I would like to thank so much these five families for hosting me. I also would like to host you in my house in Spain and see you again. So, welcome everyone to Calatayud!



But several Servas hosts gave us reassuring real time information about the situation. During our trip, at no time did we feel insecure, or witness any violent behaviour. On the contrary, people were extremely welcoming and kind, doing their best to help us travel from one place to another. We were hosted by three wonderful Servas households, starting with Sandhya. It is always mind -opening to leave one's comfort

zone and discover other ways

We visited one of the most beautiful botanical gardens in the world [**photo** preceding page], near Kandy. We could appreciate the work done to preserve endangered species. We were amazed by the works of famous architect Geoffrey Bawa who built 'sustainable architecture' well before his time.

One Servas couple took us to see: a famous Buddhist temple, [see **photo**] a Catholic church, a mosque, and a gigantic Hindu temple nearby; communities living side by side in peace.

Flooding threatened the next rice harvest. And to make



things worse, the year 2024 started with a new tax on all products, so many products are not affordable for the majority. The drastic measures taken to reduce the national debt has



the strongest impact on those who fight for a living. Now people are hoping for more tourists to improve the economy.

One long time Servas couple, Ken and Visakha, appreciate the world coming to their house, in Kandy, while they devote much of their time to help numerous social projects. 
Welcome to Sri Lanka!

We have been Servas members since 1975. In Japan, the USA, and now in Sri Lanka, we have hosted more than one hundred travelers. During our one-year trip in 1978-9, we stayed with Servas hosts in more than ten countries. Servas has been a meaningful part of our lives for 48 years, and we still maintain contact with many of these friends.

Due to Covid-19, we had not hosted for three years. We are delighted that in just the past two months, we have already had eight guests.



Recently, several physicians have asked whether we could help them obtain muchneeded equipment which they are unable to get here. Several Servas travelers and visiting friends and relatives have kindly brought small items, such as digital blood pressure meters and stethoscopes, and donated them to the local hospitals. The doctors and staff were extremely grateful for these life-saving gifts. If you're coming to Sri Lanka, we can send a list of urgently needed items. We may arrange for donors to meet the doctors and see our hospital

Sri Lanka, where we have been living for eighteen years, is a beautiful country, and we welcome all Servas members. Unfortunately, for the past two years, Sri Lanka has suffered from import restrictions, currency devaluation, high inflation, austerity cuts (IMF demands), and a newly imposed VAT of 18%. Since the crisis began, we have received generous donations from around the world and help from friends to provide food and essential items to many institutions and to hundreds of destitute families.

We held the Assembly according to the rules of the association: that is, we presented recent activities, planning, financial summaries, and audit reports.



We voted and elected members for various positions.

Everyone congratulated the new and old volunteers, who work tirelessly even in our current difficult days.

Later, we toured Yeruham Park and Lake, with Shai. Then we

went to Mount Avnon to see the great crater with Orli R. [see photo, on the preceding page]. We heard more Yeruham stories from both. We finished with lunch [see photo] at Shula's, one of Yeruham's "Culinary Queens" and heard the story of her life and her community.

We got to know the place, the environment, the communities and the projects. Thank you to everyone who participated and to those who brought reading materials and gifts for the Bedouin children in the area.

[Note: Yeruham, Israel, is a town in the Negev Desert with a population of about 11,000.]

Some days, one of us wasn't feeling well, the weather wasn't ideal, and there were frequent delays.


Despite these challenges, I'm so grateful that we had the chance to make this trip. It was unique, and I now feel more encouraged to pursue whatever I want.

A Parallel Event at CSW68

From 1947 to 1962, the commission focused on setting standards and formulating international conventions.
Thus was born a commission

which worked for elevating and improving the lives of women and girls in the world. I had the opportunity to attend CSW66 and CSW67 virtually. It was a bucket list moment for me to see so many events taking place over the period of two weeks.

The knowledge gained and the priority theme, "Accelerating the achievement of gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls by addressing poverty and strengthening institutions and financing with a gender perspective" motivated me to present a parallel event







in CSW68. In the CSW, women from various backgrounds with different experiences shared their ideas about a spectrum of issues impacting women. The experience gained here could be shared back home in our countries.

I presented a joint event with Dr Lilly Kerekes from Mexico on 19 March, 2024. We shared firsthand information and deliberated upon the theme which was "Women, Poverty and Discrimination: The Nomadic Tribes of India and Indigenous Women of Mexico". As a takeaway in CSW68 I learned about the actions, policies, programs and investments that were taken, or could be taken, to end women's poverty and gender inequality.

In short, over 100 million women and girls could be lifted from poverty if governments prioritized family planning and education, fair and equal wages, and expanded social welfare benefits.

Note: Servas offered two other virtual parallel events at CSW68 this past March. Servas USA member Rachel organized a parallel event on "Indigenous Nations US and Canada: Poverty Sources, Solutions and Collective Vision". Servas Taiwan arranged a parallel event "Empowering Taiwan Women's Independent Economic Abilities through Lifelong Learning Programs". We hope to have more on those events in the next edition of the SINB.

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Canary Islands 2024

Summary

I spent January 6 to March 3 2024, visiting eight of the Canary Islands, a Spanish archipelago off the coast of Morocco. I saw Servas hosts in Gran Canaria and Tenerife.

Nuria, a day host in Gran Canaria, invited me to go to see a movie with her. I walked with and ate with Nuria three more times in that week.

The next day, I went to Santa Cruz de Tenerife, where Tello and Verónica met me at the ferry docks! Verónica gave me a tour of the city and that evening they made a Venezuelan dish. Next day I went to the beautiful Anaga Mountains.

I took a tram to La Laguna, a beautiful historical town where I met José, who drove me to his home in Oratava: his stone house had an old aqueduct in the backyard. José showed me the historic part of Oratava, including the "house of balconies", dating back to 1632. The next day, I went to Mount Teide, the highest mountain in the Canary Islands [and also Spain] at 3,718 m. There are 321 volcanoes in Tenerife, but only Teide is still active.

I went to three more islands before returning to Tenerife. After a plane and two buses, I got to La Longuera where Fátima, my Servas host, was waiting for me.

Carnaval was going on at various towns, on various weeks. Later I caught a bus to Masca, the last on my "must see" list.

My final Servas stay was with Tony and Natalia in Bajamar, Tenerife. They lived near the only grocery store in town and Natalia told me to ask for it if I ever got lost. I went for a walk alone -- I felt very safe on my trip.

What a great journey with wonderful Servas experiences!

Hosting and Traveling for Peace

An empty or meaningful formula?

In September 2022, UN Secretary General Antonio Gutteres called for tourism to be reinvented "as a powerful instrument for progress and mutual understanding", tourism that serves people and respects the environment.

In November 2022, during our SICOGA, we worked on more eco-responsible and sustainable travel. At that very moment we were contacted by the organisers of the Terra Scientifica exhibition (in Paris) to set up a stand! Coincidence?

The Terra Scientifica exhibition is organised by the NGO OSI (Objectif Sciences International), a UN-accredited organisation like Servas, which organises a conference every December at the UN in Geneva entitled "Sustainable travel and tourism for peace and development"!

OSI's mission is to educate people by offering scientifically oriented trips to help participants better understand and respect the planet.

Terra Scientifica presents itself as the first "exhibition for meaningful travel". The exhibition organisers recognised that Servas also offers meaningful travel.

Servas allows members to discover other cultures, understand people, make new friends, and overcome prejudice. Sometimes there are longer stays for a specific purpose: learning a language, taking part in a peace school, doing things together in the service of peace, etc.

We are vigilant about respecting the environment: using low-CO2 transport wherever possible, being hosted by native inhabitants, which is the most eco-friendly form of accommodation.

By respecting people, we make them proud of their own culture.

Yes, Servas can help to reinvent travel by giving full meaning to the slogan:

"Hosting and travelling differently for Peace".

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Sleep in your own Guestroom!

Do you show your Servas guests their bed and bathroom before having a long conversation?
Do they need water, food, to fix or buy something?
A shower, a nap?
Do some laundry?
What's the Wifi code?

How many Servas beds have you slept in? Yes, we are in Servas to see *people*, but we *do* have some basic needs of comfort and privacy. Servas beds can be too hard or too soft for some travellers. Some people may prefer a hard floor, others need extra pillows.

Before you say: "Well, my guestroom is great"...
I challenge you to spend ONE night there.

Pack a suitcase with clothes, towel, tooth-brush, etc. and go to your own guestroom or pullout couch. Is there any privacy? A place to put your luggage? Did you find a spot in the bathroom to leave your things? And where does a guest hang a coat, a shirt, or a wet towel?

Did you have to move things on the bed to get in? Where do you put *this* stuff? Where can you put *your* stuff?

I stayed in a guestroom with 19 pillows on the bed, but there was space in the closet for the 17 I didn't need. That's fine.

And in the morning, how is your back? One host's son asked me, "How could you **sleep** on that awful bed?"

I slept in **my** guestroom last week and later I added a towel rack to the back of the door in the bedroom and another to the guest bathroom.

A common complaint by hosts is "I don't get enough travelers". Maybe this will help.

Try it tonight.

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


