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President's Message

Dear members,

The pace of activities did not slow down in the first four months of this year. While there were many national level activities, I would like to single out two very successful 2025 regional meetings. One was the first ever North and Central American regional meeting held in beautiful Costa Rica in February 2025. The other was a European meeting held in Wiesbaden, Germany around the same time. Thanks to the Costa Rican and German teams for making these events happen. You will see reports about the meetings elsewhere in this bulletin.





SICOGA 2025

Preparations are in full swing for SICOGA 2025 to be held in Dijon, France in October this year. The Servas International Executive Committee (SI Exco) had a weeklong meeting in Dijon, in early April to prepare for the meeting. We have been working with a large team of international volunteers (including many French volunteers) for nearly a year getting ready for the event.

This will be the largest SICOGA that we have ever had.





Registrations opened in the third week of February and there was such a huge demand for spaces that it closed within a month when the waitlist became too large. But it is still possible to participate online. There will be concurrent zoom sessions in real time, and I recommend you join in on some of the sessions. Information on the online sessions will be posted on the SICOGA website. This year many interactive fun sessions are being planned.

SICOGA BUSINESS

During the business part of the meeting many motions will be discussed about the future course of Servas. This year some of the major ideas that are the topic of motions are – (a) how to gain more youth members, (b) how to improve communication through our website and social media presence, (c) how to develop and organize activities that engage and delight our members.

Every member can take part in the discussions that shape these motions. I need your help with this process.

So, how can you help with the process?

Once the motions are received. SI Exco reviews them to check that they meet the standards for motions as laid down in our statutes, rules and procedures. All motions that are accepted will be published on the SICOGA website. It is anticipated that the motions will be posted on the website by mid-May. The accepted motions will be grouped for the purpose of discussion into subject working groups (SWGs). Once the motions are clustered into subject working groups, a moderator is appointed for each group. The moderators will send out a call requesting interested Servas members from around the world to join the discussion.

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That is where I need your help. Every Servas member is eligible to attend the discussion. Usually. communications about the SWGs will be posted on our website and emailed to your national secretaries. Please follow up with your NS and check the website for news so that you can join in the discussion. Your input is very important to ensure that the motions are crafted properly and meaningfully.

A good motion will suggest a future course of action that is different from what we currently do. It will provide a rationale for the proposed course of action. It will also provide auidelines on how the motion should be implemented. It would specify how the results should be measured and reviewed for any follow-up action. Finally, there should be an analysis of the costs and benefits involved.

When a motion is crafted well and approved, it moves us forward as an organization. Please help by joining the discussion groups (SWGs) and giving your input.

CONSIDER RUNNING FOR A POSITION DURING THE NEXT TERM

The term of every Servas International committee is 3 years, coming to an end at the end of SICOGA 2025 when new committees will be elected. I hope that some members of the current committees and teams still have some energy left and will continue for another term. It is always helpful to have some continuity.

However, we are also always looking for new blood, new talent and new ideas. Servas needs you to volunteer! I therefore invite all of you to consider joining any of the committees and teams of Servas International. Check with the nominations committee

(nominations@servas.org) to find out about the job descriptions and open positions. Please take the time to attend the meetings of the teams or committees that you are interested in to learn what the team does and whether it fits with your interests and strengths.

Finally, I would like to thank all the members of SI Exco and all the Servas International committees and teams. Thank you for all the hard work you have done over the last 3 years. It has been wonderful to be a part of this group. How very satisfying to collaborate and to continue to work with such amazing people!

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Japan: A Unique Astonishing Place

My husband and I spent March 2025 in Japan and were honoured to be hosted at four different Japanese Servas homes during our trip.

It made a big difference that we could stay 3 nights, which we requested in each home, giving us time to know our host better.

Take your host out for a meal. It is an opportunity for good chat with them.

You must have a working phone in Japan for contacting people and data for finding transportation.

Regular trains are cheap and frequent, but the bullet train / Shinkansen is not cheap: from Tokyo to Kyoto, a 10-hour trip is cut to 2.5 hours, although at 300 kph your view is often just a blur.

The easiest way to travel is to get a SUICA card at the airport or in

town. Load it (cash or credit) easily in every station or the many 7-11 shops as needed.



We registered and attended some hours of a "youth conference" in Kyoto where only 3 young ladies attended and the rest of us (8) were over 50. We had a chance to wear a Kimono and participate in the famous tea ceremony. >>>



Just tap it for trains, subways, buses, and ferry boats.

Toilets everywhere have a warm seat and a bidet with a staggering number of options.



Hurray for Google maps, it was our biggest help. It shows how, where and when to get to anywhere. Count on more time than Google map estimates. Train stations are confusing with many exits, and lots of stairs

The trip is much easier with a carry-on size bag or backpack.



Cash is king in Japan, so always have enough in your pocket. At a 7-11 you can find anything one needs including very good, prepared meals. People are very honest. Once I left my suitcase outside of a very busy train station, returning many hours later to pick it up.

Japan is quiet even in big cities and very clean. We didn't hear cars honking and smoking is banned in most places, even in the streets. Despite the crowds I was never bumped by anyone.

We enjoyed meals where locals eat. Cabbage, noodles, and onion are in most dishes. Free cold water in every restaurant, and tipping is considered an insult, so don't do it.

All our hosts were over 70. Hopefully Servas Japan's young generation will keep hosting in this wonderful country.

Welcome to the Ural, Russia in 2025!

Servas members worldwide are cordially invited to attend the Servas meeting that will take place from 30 July to 4 August 2025 in the Krasnoufimsky district, Sverdlovsk region, 215 km from Yekaterinburg which is the capital of the Ural (1800 km or 2 hours of flight from Moscow, Russian Federation).

The program includes exciting activities: festival reconstruction of culture and everyday life of the late 19th century (folk festivals), traditions, games, costumes, dances, songs, hiking, quests, riding in a horse-drawn cart, a master class on making a talisman, catamaran rafting, search for fossils at the bottom of the ancient Permian Sea. etc.

Participants will be accommodated in the campsite near the Ufa River in a safe forest, where all trees are treated against ticks and bugs. The venue has a dining room and a shower.

Those who have been part of a previous meeting [see photo] will know what a wonderful experience it is to be part of such an international event where people from many nationalities, languages and cultures come together. In addition, the participants will enjoy the wellknown Ural Russian generosity with food and drinks, their culture, churches, nature, and more.

Travel Advisory for Yekaterinburg **Conference Attendees**

We are informed by some members that due to international sanctions, Russian airlines—including Ural Airlines, which operates Airbus aircraft between Moscow and Yekaterinburg-do not currently have access to official parts, technical support, or software updates from Airbus or Boeing. Travelers are advised to consider alternative routes for safety and reliability.

Affordable and safer options include 25 to 30 hour bus and train service from Moscow, as well as international flights directly to Yekaterinburg via Istanbul, Baku, or Dubai on non-sanctioned carriers.

Servas member Russell has offered to make himself available to assist with route planning. Email your travel preferences (safety, economy, timing, etc.) to homesitesinc@gmail.com for his personalized advice.

Servas Russia's National Secretary adds: [Ask your bank if Russia accepts your credit and debit cards (maybe not ... in Russia) I don't know much about the rules to have a visa. -- Ekaterina

As coordinator of Servas Cuba. I had the honour of welcoming members of Servas Korea in October 2024 and accompanying them on their journey through my country. They arrived from the other side of the world with eyes full of curiosity, backpacks full of history, and hearts wide open. I greeted them with the warmth of my homeland and the sincere wish that they would experience something more than just a trip. And they did.

Together we explored ...

- Havana, with its vibrant, hybrid soul;
- Viñales, with its picture-postcard landscapes and legendary cigars;

- Santa Clara, where we shared the living memory of Che Guevara;
- Trinidad, which enveloped us in its colonial charm; and
- Varadero, where the sea gave us moments of beauty and serenity.
 Each place was much more than a tourist destination: it was a setting for encounter, listening, and human exchange.

One of the most cherished moments was when they met my mom. We spent time together as a family, and, as always, she

> welcomed them with that simple, genuine love that has taught me so much. Watching them connect with her was deeply moving. At that moment, I knew they were no longer just travelers: they were part of my home.





From the first day, I never felt like a stranger; we were already family. They offered me love, care, and attention. They cooked for me, we danced, we laughed, we shared stories... and I was immensely happy being by their side. I was moved, and still am, by how, despite our cultural, linguistic, and racial differences, we managed to build an authentic, human, and profound bond.

Beyond the tours and shared activities, what we experienced was a true transformation.



They discovered in Cuba a living history, a joyful resilience, a unique way of celebrating life amid adversity. I learned from their serenity, their respect for the collective, and their elegance in small gestures.

When we said goodbye, we cried, hugged, and made promises of reunion. And I understood that something inside me was no longer the same.

Today I miss them, I miss their hello in Korean every morning, their way of looking at the world with respect, sweetness, and their silent presence. But more than missing them, I'm grateful for them. Because, as a phrase I hold dear says: "Gratitude is the memory of the heart," and my heart doesn't forget.

Blessed are those who look at us with the eyes of their hearts.

I thank God and the universe, because meeting you has been a gift of life.

Thank you, my Korean family, this house will always be yours.

My heartfelt thanks to Servas International for allowing these encounters that became unforgettable moments.






My Trip to Rome



Activity period: May 13 to June 3, 2024. Visited cities/towns: Zurich, Bern, Lausanne, Lysine, Clavadel and Diessenhofen

The project "Travel to Switzerland in 2024" took place between Servas Switzerland and Servas Mexico. The main objective was to provide someone living in the countries of the southern hemisphere of the planet, in this case Mexico, the opportunity to get to know the Swiss people, so strengthening the ties of peace and brotherhood between the countries.

I spent time together with the members in their homes while sharing their food.

The places visited allowed me to have a small sample of the diversity of the country, its history, its languages, geography and culture, and above all, meeting a range of people including those born in Switzerland, as well as others who have immigrated.



Most notable activities were:

- > visits to iconic and historical places,
- > cycling, hiking and an obstacle park,
- > dinners in restaurants and delicious dinners at home,
- > moments of relaxation, watching movies,
- > enjoying landscapes, gardening,
- > playtime with the little ones or time with the oldest members of the family ,and
- > even surprise visits to the hospital, fortunately with nothing to worry about.

At the same time, I shared a little about Mexico and its culture with members of Servas. I had the opportunity also to participate in all the activities and present a summary in front of other members of Servas. I spoke about the themes of geography, biodiversity, society, culture and food.

Strengths of the project

I experienced in a direct way the daily life of people from one year old to the age of 80. This enriched my experience and allowed me to understand and empathize with the situations that each of them goes through.

It was an opportunity to observe the world from another perspective. I was able to clearly observe various aspects that I need to work on in myself.

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Art Beyond Borders: The journey of an artist from Catania, Italy

I first met Dr. Hamsavahini Singh (Hamsa) during the summer of 2022, while volunteering at the Peace School in Antakya, Türkiye —a project organized by Servas International. During that enriching experience, Dr. Singh suggested that I come to her university to conduct a workshop.

The workshop I proposed introduced a contemporary art approach that values experience over the final object.

I encouraged students to explore creative expression — toward an art form rooted in presence and place.

This concept arose from a reflection on our current global condition: how should art respond to a world overflowing with objects we struggle to dispose of? How can we reclaim our roles as human beings, not just consumers? How can art help us live more consciously, share experiences, and connect with the forces around us?

The students responded with enthusiasm. I invited them to create actively and independently, without strictly following technical instructions. In truth, I had much to learn from their impressive technical skills. What fascinated me most was how their distinct cultural background influenced their creative responses—particularly the ritualistic and symbolic aspects so deeply rooted in Indian tradition.

At first, the students preferred to remain within their comfort zones, focusing on drawing. But on the second day, they became more engaged and exploratory when I allowed more freedom, and when I gave them unstructured time to truly immerse themselves in the process.

During those moments, I stepped back, and something beautiful happened: creativity took its own path. Coming from a cultural context where connection to religion and tradition has diminished, I was moved by the recurring presence of religious elements in their artwork. Everything seemed to become a symbol, a portal to another world—something magical. Through this workshop, I aimed to share insights into contemporary Western art with these bright young women. In return, I was gifted with a deeper understanding of India's rich and diverse cultural landscape. It was not just an exchange of ideas—it was a mutual discovery.



Dr. Hamsavahini Singh adds...

I have had the privilege of being associated with Servas for the past 35 years. As an educator for more than 3 decades, I am fortunate to be in touch with young minds, and I continually seek opportunities to share and promote the values that Servas stands for.

Francesco's workshop offered students a platform to explore diverse artistic perspectives, techniques, and cultural expressions. More importantly, it created a space to foster empathy, tolerance, and peace—core values that are more relevant than ever. The seed planted by Bob Luitweiler 76 years ago is now bearing rich fruit, as international friendships flourish beyond borders.

Francesco and I extend our sincere thanks to Servas International and to Banasthali University for making this collaboration possible—for nurturing meaningful connections not only for us, but also for the Gen Z.

Initiated by Servas Korea in 2022, SIPR is a four-day, three-night cycling tour blending cycling with Korea's beautiful scenery and peace values. Last year in 2023, only one member from Taiwan, Eric Y., attended and highly recommended it. In 2024, 10 members (including two couples) participated.

Before the main Peace Riding Tour, we had a two-day, one-night **Discover Korea** warm-up event, which featured a morning table tennis game, afternoon trips to Seoul in four groups, and a grand party in the evening. Korean teams performed line dances, choruses, and model walks, with professional hair-dressers and makeup artists assisting, creating a lively and festive atmosphere.

Rida Y., from Taiwan, joined the host in the venue's kitchen to steam rice cakes, and prepare snacks and water for attendees. Although the dinner was simple, the snacks were plentiful. Rida remarked, "The performance at the party was nerve-wracking. I had been practicing backstage and really needed energy after the performance, so a plate of fruit satisfied my hunger. It was really thoughtful."

Julia Y. admired the Korean elders who cycle regularly, maintaining their health and vitality. She appreciated their companionship and support, which helped everyone push on despite fatigue.

"They took us to scenic spots and historical sites and let us experience wearing hanbok [traditional Korean clothing]. Celebrating Molly's and my birthday, and enjoying sumptuous food including a memorable picnic, were some highlights."

The meals and accommodation

were excellent. At the end of the event, Kevin L., a new Taiwan member, gave a heartfelt speech of thanks. He was moved to tears several times, creating an unforgettable moment. This SIPR event has strengthened the friendship between Servas Korea and Taiwan members, promising a lasting bond.

Back in Taiwan, members Molly & and Kevin, Julia and Alex, Fumei, Jenny and Perry have continued their cycling routines, often using Yubike* instead of taking the bus, and are feeling healthier and more active. We are all grateful to SIPR for this enriching experience and look forward to participating again next year, hoping to challenge ourselves with a non-electric vehicle journey. 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LATAM Sustainable: Circular Economy in Action

The recent environmental catastrophes in Rio Grande do Sul, Brazil, and Valencia, Spain, highlight the urgent need for action to better care for the environment and our communities. To this end, Servas is trying to go beyond environmental education and focus on sustainability education. As part of these efforts, a workshop LATAM Sustainable: Circular Economy in Action was held at the Latin American Servas Meeting, in November 2024.

Alvany Santiago (Servas Brazil) coordinated the workshop in collaboration with Ígina Pereira, also from Servas Brazil. Initially, the activity was planned to be carried out with Marcelo Sivack (Servas Uruguay), but due to Marcelo's health issues, the partnership was not possible.

With the aim of promoting ecological awareness and contributing to the transition towards a circular economy, Alvany highlighted the importance of education for sustainability. She emphasized the Sustainable Green Cities programs promoted by Brazil's Ministry of the Environment and the importance of aligning actions with the United Nations' Sustainable **Development Goals** (SDGs). An inspiring example mentioned was the municipality of Três Coroas, where the workshop was held, as one of the cities participating in the Sustainable Green Cities program favoring sustainability.

During the workshop, Alvany shared practical suggestions for developing sustainability plans applicable to families, communities, cities and countries, as well as organizing sustainable events.

- Recondition
- Repair
- Repurpose
- Recycle





To reinforce the importance of individual responsibility and collective action in achieving sustainability, in pairs, the participants also took part in a practical exercise in applying the 10R concepts.

As a closing activity, following a rafting experience, ten trees were planted in Parque das Laranjeiras.

This action symbolized a commitment to environmental preservation and the practical implementation of the values discussed during the workshop.

Overview:

In February of 2025, I attended the **PanAmerican** conference in Costa Rica and served as a volunteer interpreter, alongside Miriam Kerekes Beltrán (Servas Mexico). Most conference participants were from US Servas and Servas Costa Rica, but there were also participants from Servas Canada, Mexico, Colombia, Panama, Germany, France, Austria, New Zealand, and Guatemala. One of my favorite parts of the event was making friends and watching participants grow closer over the course of our four days together.

Many countries presented their respective countries, and had a little something to share. Among the many gifts, Canada offered salmon jerky, Mexico shared some tequila, and Colombia bracelets. A family from Servas Panama shared what Servas has meant for their family. Servas Costa Rica



brought coffee, and each country extended an invitation to come visit.

In the first two days, we heard talks on Costa Rica's biodiversity (Nancy Castro), updates on Servas International and ways to grow the organization (Radha Radhakrishna & Francisco Salomón Luna), the dances of Costa Rica (Servas Costa Rica & Irma Alvarez), the history of Servas Costa Rica (Doña Carmen Mora Mora), the dissolution of the army and history of Costa Rica (Roxana Abarca & Ligia Araya), the coffee industry in Costa Rica (Jaime Duque), changes to the Servas International website (Jim Leask & John Whidden),

On Day 3, we had a wonderful outing to see some of the natural wonders of Costa Rica, including a live volcanic crater, a waterfall on the side of the road, and a lagoon surrounded by a lush forest. Our stop at the lagoon was multi-facetted in that we were able to admire the lagoon while being hosted for lunch by the non-profit "Asociación de Desarrollo Especifica" a non-profit built this Airbnb overlooking a spectacular lagoon.

The weather was pleasant, the food was satisfying and delicious and the talks, tours and cultural presentations were well-planned.



Take-aways:

It was a great experience learning about local food, traditions, government and ways of life. One such tradition was the "El Torito" dance, which is a playful partner dance where the man acts like a bull and the woman acts like a bullfighter with her large colorful skirt. (In Costa Rica, they don't do actual bull fighting because they find it cruel.) Costa Rica is a model for peace and social justice.

The meals were well-balanced and flavorful. There is also no shortage of exotic fruit nearby.

Something that surprised me was that Costa Rica has had no army since 1949. Instead, Costa Rica has powerful "friends" and neighbors

(including the United States, the European Union, and other regional organizations) who will come to their aid in the event of a threat or invasion. By having no army, Costa Rica was able to invest more money into public education (which includes a free college education), universal health care, social development, cultural programs and conservation. And with the dissolution of the army. weapons were melted and turned into sculptures. In Costa Rica, they have literally replaced the sword with the pen.

Another remarkable thing about Costa Rica is the country's commitment to conservation. In fact, after the banana and meat industries

destroyed half of the forests in Costa Rica between 1940 and 1987, activists successfully pushed legislation to protect the existing biodiversity and increase protected natural spaces. Now Costa Rica has 52% forest cover (compared to the all-time low of 21% in 1987). How did they do it? They made alliances with politicians, planted trees, protected areas around active craters, created the national parks program, created a system of protected areas, biological corridors and interurban biological corridors, and provided incentives for land-owners who didn't develop their land. Costa Rica recognizes that protecting biodiversity and our forests can be more profitable than clear-cutting forests.

I left the conference wishing that somehow the United States could be more like Costa Rica, regarding conservation and prioritizing social development over guns and warfare. I also left the conference sad to leave such like-minded people, who had become like a second family... so I left with two new Servas friends on another adventure. ¡Pura Vida!

After the conference, I discovered the Quetzal National Park and Uvita (with my new friends from Servas Canada). I got to see a magnificent blue butterfly, a sloth and howler monkeys in the wild, avocado trees, coffee plants and a simpler way of life.

Conclusion:

If you've never been to a Servas conference, I highly recommend it. Travel with Servas not only opens your mind but also opens your heart.
