A General Assembly of Servas International was held at Mar del Plata, Argentina from September 6 to 12, 2009. The list of participants is attached as Appendix – 2.

September 6 was declared as "Day 0" and was devoted to preliminary activities such as introductions, and a Peace Course for GA participants. The actual GA sessions began from September 7.

Most of the agenda items were first discussed by different groups of participants in workshop sessions and the recommendations or proposals, which emerged from these workshops, were then put to vote in the GA sessions. In some cases, more than one agenda items were merged together by the workshops and were sent to the GA in the form of a single motion.

Each event or motion recorded in these minutes has been assigned a unique serial number with which it can be referred to, e.g. "Serial number 42 of GA 2009 Minutes" would identify a particular motion passed by GA 2009.
