Servas Moving Forward

Then I had the responsibility and pleasure to give an oral statement at the United Nations Human Rights Council in Geneva in September my speech had number 59. After Servas International came other NGO's like Human Rights Watch with number 60 and Amnesty International with 61.

I mention this to give you perspective of the importance for Servas to have access to the UN Human Rights Council as a forum. Amnesty and Human Rights Watch use this forum because it matters what is being said there and because it's an arena where your actions matters.

The Human Rights Council is a place devoted to dialogue. Representatives for governments and oppositional forces as well as NGO's can make their voices heard here.

The fact that this is a place and forum for communication between people with different views and perspectives makes it a perfect environment for Servas. One of our core tasks is to encourage increased understanding of various cultures, ideologies and religions when people meet in real life, on the Internet and via other means of communications.

The Servas representation at the United Nations in Geneva in September 25-26 was a big step forward in our plan to make Servas International better known and recognized as a peace organization.

The fact that meetings between individuals who belong to the Servas movement can meet, both in person, in our homes and in cyberspace, leads me to the question about Servas' presence on the Internet.

As you might have noticed Servas International's website has, since the beginning of this year, offered only weblinks to the national member group's websites

and an email address (helpdesk@servas.org) where basic contact information can be obtained from our support function/helpdesk.

Since Servas International is a federation of national member groups it's logical to have this basic website. But it's not satisfactory and it's not in tune with the long-term goals that Servas International General Assembly (SIGA), our highest decision making body, has pointed out.

The long term goal for SI Exco is to launch a new website at SIGA in New Zealand in October next year.

After periods of progress and a series of setbacks the so-called ServasOnline project is moving forward. This is a quite normal development for an NGO like Servas, which relies on voluntary efforts from non-paid individuals with no written contracts. Two steps forward, one backwards and then three steps forward, one backwards, and then it goes on and on...

The center of action for the ServasOnline project is now in France where the new project manager Bernard Andrieau lives.

Meanwhile, activity has been high the last couple of months to create a new and better temporary Servas International website on the web domain servas.org. Central persons for this is Stefan Fagerström, who created Servas Sweden's website, and Jean-Claude Eyot, who is the webmaster of Servas France website.

The plan is that there will be a new version of the temporary website on servas.org in November. Please surf in on servas.org and give me and the rest of SI Exco feedback, for example suggestions for improvements.

Come Down Under To SIGA2015

otearoa New Zealand wishes to offer a warm welcome to all who will attend the next Servas International General Assembly 2015. We were delighted to be selected by EXCO to host the 30th Servas International conference. The conference location is 2 hours drive to the south of Auckland a few kilometres from the country town of Matamata. This town is in the centre of productive dairy farming country, close to beautiful bush clad Kaimai ranges and hot pools – in fact there is a hot pool available for participants at the conference venue Totara Springs http://www.totarasprings.org.nz/. Matamata gained some fame for being the home of Hobbiton – the little village made for the film Lord of the Rings trilogy.

Why October?

There were several aspects considered. The season of the year, the cost of flights, and the availability of conference centres. Typically the GA has been held in

the European summer July-August however that is the height of the NZ winter. The NZ summer is December -March and coming at that time was unlikely to work for those in the northern hemisphere. February is very busy with Chinese New Year and Easter is a high travel season. This left the shoulder season (low cost for airfares) of October as the best Servas

International In New Zealand October is General Assembly! Aotearoa, New Zealand the middle of spring and day temperatures will average at 14.2 celsius or 57.6 farenheit. It is normally a time of settled weather before the heat of summer and - October 10-16, 2015 after the cool of the winter. We may look small on a world map but New Zealand is as diverse as many continents rolled into one. Some of you may wish to travel before and some after the GA. A Little About Us

time to consider.

New Zealand is a small country, similar in size to Great Britain or Japan. With a population of only four and half million people it's also gloriously uncrowded. New Zealanders are informally known as Kiwis. Approximately 69% are of European descent, 14.6% are indigenous Māori, 9.2% Asian and 6.9% non-Māori Pacific Islanders. Geographically, over three-quarters of the population live in the North Island, with one-third of the total population living in Auckland. The other main cities of Wellington,

Christchurch Dunedin and Hamilton are where the majority of the remaining Kiwis dwell.

Planning

A core group of committed NZ Servas hosts have begun the planning for this General Assembly. We are working very closely with members of SI

> EXCO, the Servas International board who facilitate this gathering. The host country provides the location for meeting, the welcome and the closing. A time line is emerging and it is hoped that all the information needed for you to plan your visit and attendance at the General assembly will be available by November 2014.

Servas New Zealand is upgrading its website to be a source of information by July-August 2014 in order to give participants time to plan their journey. Registrations will be available in early 2015.

In Spring, we had decided to focus on September 25th 2014 to organize a side-event during the 27th session of the Human Rights Council in Geneva. It was only on August 22 that we got the confirmation from the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) Civil Society Section that our request for a room has been accepted! They said they received 156 valid completed requests from 88 NGOs! I guess we were lucky! So we had to rush preparing and sending invitations, and making all necessary arrangements within a month, which was not always easy, as neither Magnus Adams nor me live in Geneva! ... The whole process was a wonderful experience, it taught us to learn more about patience... But the team kept strong and in the end it was quite an achievement!

Servas Around the World On International Peace Day

In Phoenix, Arizona

September 21, 2014: In Tempe, Arizona, the temperature finally cooled off a bit close to dusk, and Servas — Valley of the Sun celebrated International Peace Day at a community park on the evening of Sept 21 with peace builders around the world. (As we met, hundreds of thousands of people marched in

We talked about the UN proclamation and the hope for universal peace at a time of turmoil across the world. We acclaimed our hope for peace while enjoying the songs and guitar music of a newcomer. We introduced ourselves — from Hungary, Germany, India, Japan and the U.S. – and Servas members shared how this peace movement builds a real spirit of peace beginning with the traveler entering a host's house, and sharing personal experiences, histories and cultures in trust, understanding and respect.

"As a train roared by, we moved to a nearby low-lit grassy area and lit our candles. Each participant shared a few words of what peace means to him/her individually, collectively and for the earth. There was a moment of silence and reflection. Together we raised our candles to the sky to collectively shout out PEACE TO THE WORLD in every language we know!

As we left for our homes each of us felt the comfort of Hope and the positive camaraderie from a quote from Richard 1: 'Every journey starts with 11!'. Although some members had hoped for a much larger gathering at our first celebration of Peace Day, Richard's statement reminded us that a small group of 11 people strongly committed to the Servas message of peacebuilding is a powerful beginning. Though a small group, we have enough enthusiasm for building the SERVAS peace movement across the Valley of the Sun.

Lead by Dorly Schutz, coordinator of Servas Santa Catarina, the local group had a nice gathering — a picnic at Ramiro Ruediger Park, in Blumenau city, sharing messages about peace, reflections and ideas

There was also interaction with students from Educating for Human Rights and Peace Project, at Federal University of São Francisco Valley, whose campus is located there. Besides celebrating peace and friendship among the members, the meeting was an important moment to talk about Servas and promote the organization.

Servas At Home At The UN-NYC

n September 25-26 Servas International, SI, made what may well be its most decisive effort so far in the history of the organisation to make our voice heard and our presence known in the United Nations setting.

A group of dedicated Servas volunteers arranged for SI members to visit the United Nations Office in Geneva and to arrange for our own special event called International Peace Builders. SI is an non-governmental organisation has consultative status with United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) and this gives us access to the UN premises in the Palais des Nations.

At the Human Rights Council* the Servas group listened to oral statements about terrible human rights violations. The SI volunteer Magnus Adams and I presented two minutes oral statements at the Human Rights Council. In my speech I stressed the we, the individuals who belong to the Servas movement, are convinced in the effectiveness of our hospitality program. Our program is based on person-to-person interaction and exchange, and it increase tolerance and understanding across cultures.

I emphasized – among other things – that all people should have the freedom and economic means to move freely and to travel to see the world and widen their understanding of other cultures, faiths and religions.

Our consultative status with ECOSOC made it possible for Servas to use a spacious meeting room at no extra cost. Mayors for peace was one of the invited NGO's that came to the meeting and participated in the discussion.

During the two days in Geneva it became obvious for all of us who were present that the United Nations can work in partnership with Servas and other parts of civil society on issues of global concern.

I felt – and I know I can speak for everyone in the group – felt at home in the UN environment. With our intervention we did a strengthen and support the efforts made by the international community to reach a sustainable peace.

UN DPI was trying to achieve a platform for civil society voices to come together at the UN for an ambitious and successful post 2015 agenda.

I found the Conference informative and worthwhile. I think its primary goal was to increase awareness on the important role of Civil Society in the successful implementation of the Post-2015 Development Agenda, as well as introduce and provide resources that will support our work as a member of the NGO community.

As a personal experience it was very important to me to interchange experiences with people around the world, and knowing the different complaints they have about what is happening in their countries.

There were many topics covered during the Conference with several roundtable discussions and multiple workshops, and all speakers did an outstanding job of sharing their expertise with all participants.

For next Conferences2, Servas has to bring a voice for a sustainable development agenda, bringing strategies, expertise and resources across the broadest spectrum of civil society to move poverty, eradication, sustainability, human rights, and climate justice into the mainstream discourse, and spark sustained public demand for lasting political action in support of an ambitious outcome from the post-2015 sustainable development process.

I think this because the variety of nations integrated in Servas make possible the treatment of the civil problems in all of them.

hese guestions took many directions at our meeting, at the Dalesbridge Centre in Yorkshire, England and these are questions we all need to ask ourselves as Servas members. Although founded as a "peace organisation" we all may recognise that "peace" can be in many forms, from participation at the UN to smaller simpler rituals, such as sharing a meal with guests, and comparing and contrasting our lives in conversations that extend into the small hours of the night. Indeed, we may occasionally host travellers, or even be hosted by hosts, who have little sense of the origins of the organisation, but at the end of the stay, we may have acquired new cultural and ethical perspectives, leading to increased tolerance. Even in some cases, we may agree to disagree.

Servas is a complicated organisation, and we had members attending from about 16 different countries. We had organised meetings and informal discussions, resulting in long lists of ideas, aims and objectives. Some examples are:

 Working more closely with organisations that share the aims of Servas, as well as bringing people together within Servas who share special interest groups



- Looking at possibilities for more in-depth experiences and longer stays focused on language-learning, volunteering or work experience
- Offer the potential to set up a Servas International resource exchange, connecting people interested in taking part in and offering more in-depth

Extensive discussions centered around SOL (Servas on line), and the new website which will bring Servas into the 21st Century. Matthew Pashkovskii, from the SOL team, spoke about the development of the website and online functions

for travellers to search with and make contact with hosts. The new website should provide information about Servas International to potential new members.

On two occasions Amir Levy from Israel set up a SKYPE link to Jonny Sågänger, president of Servas International, from Stockholm, Sweden. We were able to share our thoughts, ask questions and get his feedback, not only about SOL, but also other Servas issues and activities. Another SKYPE link enabled Marijke and Chris in New Zealand, to tell us about the next SI General Assembly, to take place near Auckland in October 2015.

We looked at the new SI Logo presented by Terry Stone on behalf of its designers Alan Stone and Stefan Fagerström. It was well received and we thought it presented an appealing up-to-date image for Servas.

Three Sample Topics Discussed At Dalesbridge

IN-DEPTH AND LONGER-STAY EXPERIENCES

How can Servas promote more indepth experiences and extended stays for the benefit of both travellers and hosts? What mechanisms would help achieve this?

An enthusiastic debate looked at how in-depth experiences and longer stays could enhance encounters between travellers and hosts and promote peacebuilding activities within Servas.

There is much potential for Servas to promote such possibilities that go 'beyond the two nights stay'. There are already some notable examples, such as the children's project in Turkey each summer, where Servas members can get involved in community activities.

12 specific recommendations were developed on this issue.

TRAVEL PEACEFULLY AND WALK LIGHTLY ON THE EARTH

Should Servas have a policy on ethical, sustainable travel and concern for the environment?

A discussion group looked at how we might reduce our impact on the world's environment when we travel and support local tourist initiatives which most directly benefit the communities we visit.

The Utopia of Peace Village

Report From This Year's "Live With Us Share With Us" Event In Turkey July 6-16, 2014

Workshop: Peace word in many languages

t was born very little but it grew up very fast. Its roots have gone deeper inside the earth and the branches stretched happily to the sky in a short time. It has turned out to be a huge tree where hundreds of people can sit

underneath. This is Live with Us Share with Us Children Programme (LUSUP).

LUSUP took place this summer again, over ten days, with 22 volunteers coming from Spain (Catalonia), Romania (Transylvania), Guatemala, France, Iran and Turkey and 70 local children in Ekinci, (a village of Antakya in Turkey). It was clear that the programme left distinctive influence behind it. The Servas volunteers, hosted by local families, studied environmental issues, peace, art, music, creative drama, different languages, chess, played children games and did reading activities with children. They displayed short movies, did radio interviews, country presentations, multi-lingual choir, taught how to make Origami enthusiastically. "The program area turned out to be a Servas Campus" as Catalan Volunteer Quim described it. The house yard, the streets and the big garden named Amazon were the places for sharing, learning, having fun, thinking and discovery.

One of the participant children named Çnar said; "I love Servas because we learn different things here." The programme aims to reach exactly this goal. It succeeds by bringing people from all around the world into the village and through the volunteers introducing new ideas, activities, programmes, games, languages and different cultures of world to the local children. It is a mutual transfer of the knowledge, experience and background. The children receive new ideas whereas volunteers learn vast cultural diversity of Antakya (Antioch) through children, local volunteers and people. Another child, Ali, said, "I even didn't know where Guatemala was. Now, I have two friends from this country. They are so sweet."



Different languages different lives...

Children started the day saying "Good Morning" in Arabic, Turkish, Catalan, Hungarian, Spanish, Greek and other languages. They learnt

how to say peace, colours in these languages and also sing. The songs of multi-lingual choir left a great effect on children and families. The goal was to raise awareness towards languages. We were relieved when we heard colorful words coming from the mouths of children at the Servas Campus every day. The goal was met. The views of Catalan (volunteer) therapist on the children's language ability were not surprising. Quim said; "Kids can pronounce words in different languages easily and learn them quickly. They can also sing. This is something amazing. "The reason, actually, is that the kids usually

grow up bilingual (Arabic-Turkish) in the region of Antakya. They discover their mother tongue, Arabic, which is now fading away day by day, and learn about other languages through this programme. It is obvious that the child who is involved in many languages shows the highest possibility of becoming a peace lover in the following stages of her/his life. Not only the language sessions but also most of the activities carried out within LUSUP aim to plant colourful peace seeds in children.


Local people experience & discover

"Our parents started to feel proud of us once we started to communicate in English with the volunteers. Because they liked the volunteers and appreciated the efforts they did for the local kids. The idea of going abroad did not sound strange to them now," said Selen, one of the local translators studying English language at University. Muhterem, who hosted a volunteer, tells; "People coming from every corner of the world try to learn our culture. They like and respect it. They learn Arabic and Turkish words. Also, they try to learn the different cultural aspects of Antakya. Honestly, I am also becoming more aware of my culture each time they ask me questions." Another host, Semire, explains; "Marina from Catalonia, asks many questions about our life, traditions and meals. When my daughter Esra (local translator) fails to answer some of the questions she asks me or her father. Esra is becoming more curious about life here and in the world." Local children get to know new people and they learn how to trust people coming from different cultures and learn from them. 10-year old girl Yaren says; "I love Servas people because they are good hearted." Isn't it a precious experience at this age of the children? Arzu, who is keen on art, says; "we walked through the old streets of Antakya. We lay down and painted the lovely pictures of the church with lovely orange trees and the well. We also visited

the mosque and the synagogue a few meters far from the church. It was amazing!" The kids are introduced with the value of 'living together despite the differences' through the vast and old experience of Antakya.

The young woman, Ela, who hosted the Iranian volunteer Nasim deals with communication problems via google translate. She is talking joyfully while patting her baby in her lap: "Nasim cooked Persian food for us. They tasted very different. I think I can learn English until next year. Don't forget, Mehmet. I want to host at least one Servas teacher every summer." I note it down.

LUSUP and Servas seeds like these, land and have blossomed very guickly. The village has become part of the world information and culture network within six years. A new generation who are familiar with global thinking has grown up now.



Volunteers, arriving with different predictions, knowledge, cultural background and expectations in Antakya (40 km far from border of Syria) notice in the face of local people broad smiles and welcoming (Ehlen Vesehlen-Arabic) expressions at the very beginning. Living together with host families creates a magical power which brings people very close in a short time. Any prejudices or hesitations disappear.

The sightseeing tours organised for volunteers allows them discover the multicultural life background of Antakya. Once they learn that different religions have been living together and touching each other for ages they realise that they are in an unusual spot of the world. At that moment I try to explain, Szerénke, coming from Transylvania; "Turkey has many faces. Antakya is just one of those many faces."

The children, instead of going home at night, worked like ants to learn from their photography teachers (Esra & Fatih) how to write names with light through photo

cameras. The next day children went photo safari to shoot photos on friendship, helping others and love during the hot sunny day. Looking at the results, Fatih said; "The children have sensitive souls and curious eyes. They really excited me. I felt just like them. We found ourselves planning the next year photography topics."

Chess trainer, Erdem, didn't expect such big interest for chess. He got lost with kids holding their chess tables in the deep spots of the fruit garden every day. We sometimes forgot them and they also forgot the time despite the approaching darkness.

Experienced volunteer Zuleyha brought the Little Prince into the village. Children loved him. They read a piece of his adventures every morning, discussed his philosophy, did role plays and wrote him letters. At the end, volunteer artist, Leonie, painted Little Prince in the wall picture (Wonderland) she created with the kids. Little Prince visited the kids in the village and introduced his little planets to make discoveries about life.

The atmosphere that the programme created in the village was amazing just like every year. Quim says; "there is a lovely feeling in the streets and people. I see positive

things everywhere. Lots of suprises. Lots of different things". Nasim; we are always surrounded with children. They try to communicate and learn from us. Very curious and polite." Reka; "what kind of a place is a village? How do the houses look like from inside? I can find answers for these questions through this experience. Also, I am here to teach and learn." The programme focuses on environmental issues as well. The video and photo cameraman, Nico from Barcelona introduced children how to make flower pots out of plastic bottles. Then, they planted wheat seeds in the pots, watered them every day and witnessed how the seeds turned to be little wheat trees. 14-year-old child Berdan explains; "it is amazing to grow up something." Adela from Guatemala dressed in Mayan costumes and taught children how to make Pinata in a whole week. At the end, they had a party to blow up the Pinata and collect the candies fell out of it. It was a big fun. A tradition from the Central America could find a place here in the Middle East. Amazing, isn't it?

It was me who took any advantage to reflect peace thoughts to the souls, eyes and brains of the kids throughout the programme. One day, wanted them to design their own peace organisation and a logo for it. The results were wonderful. One group of children imaged to form a music band and give concerts in the regions of war or conflicts. Another group wanted to organise big meetings of people from neighbouring

countries at the borders. They displayed these ideas on posters at Servas Campus for their friends.

Actors and radio workers coming from Transylvania combined sports, drama and games together and had lovely time with kids in the olive tree gardens and streets. They also did a professional radio interview with all the programme participants to be broadcasted by the radio station in their country

Local translators explore new windows

LUSUP tries to use the local potential as much as possible. More people participate in the programme every year. Young people, going to university soon, found more opportunities to volunteer as translators, guides and assistants during the programme. Hosting volunteers helped them set up friendships and overcome language barriers. They were not only translating for the children but also for their parents and neighbours. So the transfer of experience among people was succeeded. Young people developed their own self confidence and started to imagine new lives out of borders. One of the translators, Esra, explains with excitement; "it was a far dream to travel even to another city of Turkey before LUSUP but now, I am making plans

to visit Marina and Nico in Barcelona. Aliye joins the conversation; "my parents do not think that it is weird to go abroad and volunteer. I think they changed her mind after meeting the Servas volunteers.

Growing up with LUSUP and hosting volunteers for 6 years, Mevsim received a lot of praises during the programme as she showed high language competency and was very helpful. Let's listen to her, "Servas programme was my first

motivation to learn English. Marilyn who was one of the volunteers from Canada helped me learn the first words in 2009. I learnt many things about the world with this language." Language student, Gizem says; "I have never had such fruitful time in the summer until this year. I wish the volunteers could stay longer."



LUSUP proves again that any person with genuine experience, background, perspective and values can travel to different places on earth and share this potential with the local children and people. It is time to promote this programme in different parts of the world since it carries the potential of activating the local resources, provoking the inner worlds and curiosity of children, introducing the idea of world citizenship, increasing awareness towards environment and providing a fruitful summer holiday for volunteers. Besides, it costs a little and is applicable since it requires minimum bureaucracy. The promotion of this programme would bring effective outcomes. First of all, the gap between the poor and the old in different parts of the world or/and within the countries would be filled to some extent. Secondly, LUSUP would improve ideas of peace among people of the world and the risk of war would decrease. Thirdly, the 'unpopular' countries would find the chance of receiving volunteers and travellers. Finally, some individuals who have high living standards and intellectual background and thinking that 'something must be done' to make the world a better place could find a way out through this programme.

Making LUSUP one of the main programmes of Servas international and then promoting this programme in different parts of the world with the cooperation of related NGOs is the biggest utopia of the coordinator of LUSUP. It is obvious that it would be not difficult to find hardworking dreamers to share this utopia.

ood was delicious and the company of Servas friends from Chile and Uruguay was wonderful. Added to that, the attractive panorama of the Sierras cordobesas. We planted a tree of an autochtonous specie of the region and we set a bronze plaque to commemorate it.

Ideas were exchanged on how we can attract people to join Servas. We're finishing a letter which many people collaborated to write and the idea is that every member will post it in FaceBook together with a Servas promotional video to let more people know about Servas and get interested in joining.

We explained how important it is that in the future, National Boards be presented to national elections as a team and not as individual candidates. There have been important disagreements among members of the NB in

the past and we reached the conclusion that it is better to come to agreements and form a work team before people are elected.

Some ideas on the role of the South American Coordinator were said, a "sensitive" matter right now in the Region. Elections will be held in the near future. On one side, Argentina and Uruguay proposed to redefine the Mission of the Area Coordinator and the Guidelines for the position. This proposal is originated on the need to prevent malfunction and omissions by the Area Coordinator, as it has happened in the past. This proposal was presented to EXCO, with no results as yet.

My First Servas Travel Experience

Japan May 2014

y parents were frequent travellers. In fact, I do not remember any time where we spent December holidays at home. Every school holiday we went away travelling. Sometimes Sumo Wrestling near, sometimes far, but always away.

Hence my travel bug has been inherited, and now, in my early 60s, it still is there, as good as when I was a child.

About 4-5 years ago, I started learning Japanese, with the objective of eventually travelling to Japan and being able to communicate with the ordinary Japanese person. I did not expect this language to be as difficult to learn! With all those years behind me, I have a very basic knowledge, but enough to ask my way around and to hold a very basic conversation.

Just before starting to book our accommodation. I remembered a friend mentioning Servas a few years ago, and I thought to myself that this is a great idea for my intended visit to Japan.

And so it became to be. My partner and I became Servas travellers and after lots of correspondence, had our stay in Japan organised.

We stayed with 5 different hosts, each of them guite different from the previous.

We learned a lot about Japan, Japanese customs, traditions and food.

In most places we slept on futons on the tatami floor, the traditional way, and found that we actually slept better than when we were given a bed!

We found that Japanese people are





very proud of their country and their traditions. They will go out of their way to help you learn about their culture. For example, one of our hosts insisted on also being our private guide for the day, and having a previous commitment for the second day, she organised a friend to come with us in her stead. No payment was accepted, not even allowing us to pay for lunch.

Another host brought out her parent's wedding Kimono and dressed us in it. What an experience that was! They also brought out a deck of cards so we could play a Japanese game, and showed us a shrine that they had built a short time ago for the Japanese "Children's day"

We were taken to an Izakaya (Japanese pub) to drink Sake and Japanese beer and were introduced to several snacks that we had never even seen before such as deep fried cartilage (yummy!), we were shown beautiful parks and places we would not have dreamed of visiting and given good advice on what and where to see, for example, on the recommendation of our Tokyo host while visiting the resort of Hakone, we went to a beautiful Onsen (natural hot spring bath resort) where we were the only non-Japanese guests at the time.

To cut a long story short, we had a most successful trip, took thousands of pictures, 'lived' a Japan that most tourists do not see. A great Servas experience.

Needless to say, one of my first actions after coming home was to apply to become a Servas host.


member Judith invited us to stay for nearly a week in her home in exchange for some help with deer fencing in her


Finally just before New Year's Eve the most amazing thing happened. Our hosts in Sydney told us that they are going away for a

Thoughts About A Complaint Management System Within Servas

n a peace organisation like Servas complaints are something we don't really want to think of. And luckily enough it doesn't seem we often have to. But nevertheless it is important to at least think about it. So this topic arose during the General Assembly 2012 in Poland, which led to the following decision on 24th August as item 6:

"6. Handling of Complaints

The Conflict Resolution Committee, NSs and other volunteers coordinated by New Zealand, work together to prepare guidelines on how to act when complaints about hosts or travellers are received."

In February 2014 this year Marijke Batenburg, National Secretary for Servas New Zealand sent out a questionnaire to all National Secretaries worldwide to find out on how these problems are handled in the different countries.

Before giving an update of the whole process in a

later issue of SI News I would like to add some personal thoughts about a possible "complaint management":

Complaints about travellers and/or hosts may have different reasons. Some of them may even be just misunderstandings, lack of communication etc. Still it is often very hard to settle a conflict between the two sides involved immediately. And especially when it is more than just a misunderstanding it may lead to a heavier conflict which can again lead to the exclusion of a Servas member (worst case). In any case complaints have to be taken seriously, and it might be advisable that not only the Servas country involved will be in charge of the treatment of the complaint.

Of course it is not a bad idea to have in every country a contact person responsible for the handling of complaints, but in many cases it might be much easier to contact a "Complaint Committee" (CC) or whatever you may call it. In this case the committee members will have to make sure that there is always, without exception, at least one member who can be contacted directly. This is important as the CC in some cases will have to react immediately, especially when (like in most cases, I guess) it is a matter between Servas members of different countries. If the complaint is handled by a national representative then this person will have to contact Servas International or all other National Secretaries anyway. And I personally would like Servas to more act as a global organisation. In any case there should always be a close link between the CC and all the persons in charge in every Servas member country.

Wherever it will be and whatever will be the solution in the end: Complaints will always have to be handled very carefully. Often enough things get different once you've heard both sides.

And it is very important to separate the "cultural" reasons from reasons that have to do with ignoring the Servas values or even criminal acts. So it will be necessary that things can be discussed in a group of people with different backgrounds. Therefore this committee should consist of members from different continents. And they have to be very well trained as it comes to understanding of different cultures, of conflicts that may have a gender-related background etc. At this point it makes sense, I believe, to perhaps make the CC part of the Conflict Resolution Committee (CRC). But, and this is the difference I see – the CRC in this case would come second, at least in "cases of emergency", as mentioned above.

Of course, after a host or traveller of his country has been excluded, the representative of this Servas country can ask for a more intensive discussion, but there should be an international "authority" to be able to react quickly, if needed.

Later on, when Servas Online is finally being established, the CC will need to either have direct access to the system itself or direct contact to the people running the system, so that a global "warning system" plus an immediate suspension of a membership and/or Lol could follow.

Again: I do hope this will only be necessary in very rare and extreme cases – but we'll have to be prepared. Especially as one of the reasons why we are looking forward to having Servas Online is to make things easier to become Servas members. But then it is also important to keep in mind that the system could be misused – i.e. that someone who lost the right to travel with Servas could try to get a new Lol in another country where he/she is just travelling. But this is the next step...

How To Be A More Sustainable Traveler

COOK TOGETHER

Cooking is essential to share our gastronomy and heritage culture, it could be more organic and healthy, since we know its origin and how they are cooked. Besides, all can participate and it is a great moment to talk and share. If you decide to go out go to markets where you can find local food such as fruits and vegetables that are unique, different and organic. For your health and for the planet avoid garbage food.

RIDE A BIKE OR WALK
For short or medium distances bike riding is a fun way to know a place. It's cheap, you'll get exercise and will be helping the planet by reducing pollution. Walk for short distances and you'll have a great opportunity to talk.

DON'T USE PLASTICS, BUY WATER It is easier to carry a water filter (available at camping stores) and a cylinder. Use recycled and/or resusable carry bags.

BUY LITTLE, BUY LOCAL

It's always better to avoid buying things since we live in such a devastating consumer society. You don't need to buy things to show friends or family you care but if you do, buy local, in markets or villages, direct from the producers. You'll support the handcrafts of local people who survive on it, plus you'll have an original present at a fair price, as well. It's also an opportunity to meet local artists and learn about their techniques, materials and lifestyle.

SHARE YOURSELF

Leave something behind as a remembrance of your visit, something not touchable. Prepare a conference, a performance, teach a local dance or how to cook traditional food. Focus on ecological issues that care about sorroundings so your travel can have an armonic and spiritual trace, for example to plant a tree!

ORGANIZE AN EVENT

Ask the National Secretary to help you organize a little event when you can share something special and unique about your culture: it's gastronomy, celebrations, habits, language phrases. Ask your host to organize a small gathering of their family and friends where you can share your pictures, knowledge and special talents (and, as a host, you can do the same).

TAKE AN ALTERNATIVE TOUR
Go beyond the typical tourist routes! By going deeper we truly

routes! By going deeper we truly have a bath of local culture. Keep an open mind and see behind the typical scenes. Discovering those secret or folkloric places can be an amazing, funny or even a rewarding adventure. Plan to visit sustainable projects around the community. If your host doesn't know of one in his or her area use the opportunity for you both to do some research and maybe even become involved in one.

Try to reduce your air travel as much as possible. Airplanes generate more pollution than any other kind of transport on the planet. Air travel may be increasing around the world but we SERVAS travelers can help reduce the carbon footprint by taking buses, ferry boats, car pooling and - when it's safe to do so - even hitchhiking.

RESPECT THE ANIMALS

The animals are an essential part of the planet so do not feed them, avoid visits to zoos and circuses. At home or on the streets respect them at any possible way, and, if possible, do not eat them!

PLANT A TREE

There is not a better symbol to unit you with the nature of a place and also with the hosts.

Invite the community to do so, film it, share it. Let's make a great campaign of our own.

SHARE SUSTAINABILITY CONCEPTS AND EXPERIENCES

Any personal point of view about ecology and alternative ways of living and respecting nature will be always beneficial for everyone, especially if you want to be a an ecology responsible traveler.

Host List News

ere is an update on two of our main ongoing projects. If you would like more information on either, or both, please drop me an email.

Start-Up Contacts

SI Exco is working on a project to be known as 'Start-Up Contacts. This is to make it possible for a person to be a 'member of Servas' even if there is no Servas group in the country or area where he/she lives. Arrangements for an interview (possibly by Skype) and the issuing of a Letter of Introduction can be made directly with Servas International until there is an opportunity for a Servas group to develop in their own country.

Once there are 10 or more members we can to create a new Servas member country. At present we have about 14.000 hosts in over 115 countries. The total population in these countries is about 6.7 billion.

But there are about 70 other countries (with populations between 100,000 and 38 million) where there are NO hosts yet. In these countries about 0,5 billion people live who could be potential future members of Servas.

The host list reliability test

The host list reliability test is in progress. According to the procedures set down by the SI General Assembly there are 71 countries where the reliability of the host lists are to be checked. The host lists of 40 other countries will not be tested, because these lists had a good result (70 % or more reliability) in the tests in 2010.

We have around 30 volunteers who are doing the tests. E-mails will be sent to hosts and checked for a response before a reliability percentage is calculated.

So far we have results from 49 countries. Once the tests are completed results will be sent out in a report to all National Secretaries.

HOSTING IN ARGENTINA

We're 366 members and we have our list up to date but some people could still not answer, but it's not the rule. Of course the phone still works, but we prefer to receive an email or a letter and a copy of the LOI, just for security!!!

The letter from Ana Manghi on the previous page brings up some very good issues that the Servas community has been struggling with for a while now, especially in the era of email and increased ease of travel.

As I read it, the two points that Ana makes are:

- 1. Letters of Introduction (LOI) should be included with any and all correspondence with a host.
- 2. Mass emailings are not polite and must be avoided.

I've been thinking over these issues since my most recent solo trip in Europe this summer. I stayed with many wonderful hosts, made contact with all them only through email. (Of course, I always included a copy of my LOI.)


I compleely agree with Ana that sending your LOI should be a given. for safety's sake, if nothing else. (But let's face it, when opening your home, or travelling to unknown hosts, there is always an element of risk. One of the major lessons I have learned through Servas is to let go of fear. On the whole, the world is a safe place (at least in my world) and I trust my fellow man much more now than I did before Servas. Living in fear is a very nasty place to be, imho.)

Anyway, back to Ana's letter, and where I disagree!

As I traveled around I wasn't always sure where my path would lead me. I figured planning a week in advance was fine. (If that was too short a notice for some hosts, no problem, I didn't take offence.)

Major problem for me was, I found I could tell very little about a potential from our host lists when initially contacting them: just age, current or previous profession, and some interests. Not even

a picture. (I would know a lot more about a potential host from CouchSurfing (CS)! At least there are pictures and write ups on CS.) So the personal appeal of potential hosts was very limited (Gee, a retired, 60 year old teacher, who likes nature and Greenpeace.) Although I was more interested in meeting Servas members than seeing




Then, if I were to pick only one host on my route to email, I would have to wait to see if they responsed, and if they weren't on top of their email game, bang, my week's planning is gone, and I had no other option but to take a souless hotel. I don't think emailing to five hosts in Manchester at the same time is a horrible social problem,

I believe in mass emails. It's nothing personal, not an insult, not impolite. It's just using the technology to do what it's best at. If someone wants to take offence, that's their choice, but certainly not intended by the traveler. If I can email 5 hosts in a general area, I have a much better chance of staying with a wonderful Servas host, and avoiding

that soulless hotel. I would hope that we can encourage spontaneity, whenever possible.

While I'm at it, here's another issue that bugged me, as a traveler. "Sleeping bags

or bedbags are advised"? As a traveler, hauling around 1 to 3 months of personal items in a rollie bag, I can't imagine adding a sleeping bag or bedbag to my load. And then where would I wash it? When I host, as I do a lot here in Greece, I figure that doing one extra load of laundry is a given, as is supplying toilet paper and a hot shower.



And oh, how I adore lots of hooks and hangers in a room so I can air out stuff. A bed off the floor. And WiFi, and a couple of electrical outlets!! But I'm getting carried away.

Please, feel free to follow up on this discussion. Servas is changing, and I'm so glad to be a part of it. It's an exciting time to live in!



Why I Did Not Visit Any Hosts This Year

s a private pilot I am always looking at ways of extending my piloting skills. I have previously done a bit of mountain flying and loved it - rather different from the relatively flat land of East Anglia in Britain. So when I saw a notice about a week long pilots meeting which included mountain flying, in Germany, I signed up for it. I decided to extend this to a three week tour, by car not aircraft, where the only definite points were Dover-Dunkerque departure, a couple of days drive to Eggenfelden, a week at Eggenfelden, just over a week touring and Dunkerque-Dover return. Accommodation at Eggenfelden was taken care of by camping at the airfield. The rest of the journey provided an opportunity for Servas or probably a mix of camping and Servas.

Servas, as we know, requires a Letter of Introduction and host lists. No worry about the Lol. I got that sorted. However host lists are a problem. Deciding on host lists requires some sort of plan. Initially I had thought of touring round Germany and trying to improve my despicable German. With this there was a possible pop in to Denmark to call on a friend if he was available. With that I might have looked more at the northern area. However my friend was going to be busy

so I cut out Denmark. Eggenfelden is near the borders with The Czech Republic and Austria. Maybe I wanted to go south or east. So I got a rather old hard copy host list for Germany along with the electronic copy and added electronic copies for The Czech Republic and Austria. That seemed to give me a reasonable amount of latitude.

The outbound leg was camping as I had no idea how far I would get each day or even my exact route and wanted no commitment to times or places that Servas required. After a week with flying in the Austrian Alps I was making decisions about where to go next. Having enjoyed Austria from aloft I decided to explore on the ground level. A quick rule of thumb (I measure distances on the map with my thumb!) showed me I could drive round the perimeter of Austria, more or less, in the time available. I was unsure about The Czech Republic as I had heard I would have difficulty with languages there, confirmed later when chatting with a Czech guy at an Austrian campsite.

What about Servas? Thereby laid a major problem. The Austrian host list had not saved properly on my netbook, problems with Adobe, but I could download it from the email. Out on a campsite with no electricity or internet

it was not possible to access the host list, charge up the netbook and my basic mobile (which had probably run out of money anyway). So there was no way of finding out about Austrian hosts. Added to this one must book a host in advance. Most NPNR still like some warning, although I have been quite happy when people have turned up at the door following NPNR to the letter. Each day I would only have a vague idea where I might end up in the evening. I dislike planning ahead as I then miss out on items that just turn up but have to be turned down if they do not fit in with the schedule. Staying with Servas hosts requires planning and commitment which is not my style of travel. So to go with my flying I had a couple of glorious weeks with no commitment, no planning, no internet, no phone calls, camping every night a bit muddy at times but so what, bliss. I did miss out on potential interesting discussions with Servas hosts. One cannot have everything and at camp sites there were interesting people to chat with.≠

So what does this tell us? Servas may be all modern by being electronic and internet. However as I commented about 12 years ago that does not account for those people who do not have internet access or even computer access. Then riding my motorbike through Norway I did not have space for a computer and there was not internet access in many places. I could not have gone Servas without a hard copy of the host list. This time I was in a car with space for my netbook but no internet access hence no Servas.

Servas requires:

- Internet access
- Electronic access
- Phone access
- Electricity to power computer and phone
- Forward planning by quite a few days even when NPNR.
- Definite pre-planned overnight stops
- Commitment to going where planned and so no change of route

I did not have any of these and so could not visit Servas hosts. How many other potential Servas travellers come across the same problems?

So a plea, repeated from 12 years ago, please do not rely only on electronic means as this disenfranchises some people. At times hard copy is the only viable method for contacting hosts.

How To Prepare Your Submission For Publication In Servas International News

ACCEPTABLE MATERIAL

- Details on Upcoming International Events & Meetings
- Articles on Servas activites in your country, opinion pieces on peace, travel & hosting, travel stories with a Servas Theme
- Letters to the Editor (complaints, questions, praise)
- Short quotes regarding peace/travel/friendship, etc.
- Servas travel experiences, peace projects, event reports
- Web sites of interest to Servas members
 Send files to newsletter@servas.org

MATERIAL NOT ACCEPTABLE:

- Events or announcements of interest only to an individual country's members
- Long reports, such as technical and financial data, should be posted on the Servas web site.

Send such material by email to: add to website@servas.org.

IMPORTANT THINGS TO DO:

- DO assume the reader knows nothing about your story. Provide an opening paragraph that explains what your story is going to be about. Include the Who, Why, What, Where and When in the first paragraph. Remember, you're writing a STORY or presenting INFORMATION not an sending an email or letter to a friend.
- DO give your story an APPROPRIATE HEADLINE and, if possible, a SUBHEAD, so your reader has an idea of what is being presented.
- DO include your (the author's) name, Servas title (if any), your country and, if you want it public, your email AT THE BEGINNING OF THE STORY immediately following the headline or subhead

(the exception would be for a Letter to the Editor where it should be at the end).

- DO make your article engaging and interesting, and pertinent to an INTERNATIONAL audience.
- DO avoid abbreviations so your message is clear.
- DO spell check and proof your story, twice. If possible have a friend review it for you. We will not edit your copy unless there are space limitations.
- DO prepare your story in a text application such as Microsoft Word, TextEdit. Save your file as .doc, .rtf or .txt format and attach to e-mail. Please give your file a name that RELATES TO YOUR STORY.
- DO include photos in .jpg format at 150 dpi or better in the SAME email (but NOT inside your text file).
- DO review this and previous issues of SERVAS INTERNATIONAL NEWS for examples of story format and structure.
- DO thoroughly proof your article/event listing/letter before submitting it. We do not correct for spelling or grammar. Some editing may be done for space limitations.

THINGS YOU SHOULD NOT DO:


- DO NOT format your text with tables and fancy fonts.
- DO NOT double-space after a sentence.
- DO NOT add a space before a period or comma. Remember, a computer is not a typewriter.
- DO NOT enter double paragraph returns.
- DO NOT place photos within the story text. Submit them sperately in the same email.
- DO NOT write your story in an Emal message.
